Supt. Ellis reminded board members graduation dates were May 10 at 7 p.m. for CMS and May 11 at 2 p.m. for CHS. He noted the Pre-K graduation would be held on May 9th at 5:30 p.m. at Johnsonville Elementary School.



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



of his love and wisdom since I was a small boy. I could not begin to count the blessings that have accrued to my family and me over my lifetime as a result of my brother's influence on my life.

Some of my earliest memories as a child were Ed getting up at 4 am, still in his teens, packing a lunch bucket and heading out over ice slick roads to work in the oil fields. Whatever money he earned, he shared with the family, especially with my sisters and me who were still young and in school. Going into Norris City with him every Saturday morning and getting a burr haircut at Will Harlow's barbershop and washing his car for his Saturday night date were some of the highlights of my youth. He was my big brother who I always looked up to and was always proud of.

He finished high school and went to college while he was still in the Army, sent pictures home of far away places, told me in every letter to get a good education, and fueled my own dreams of learning and contributing to my fellow man.

When my sister, Jolene, was tragically killed in an automobile accident her senior year, I became depressed and wanted to drop out of high school. It was the sternest lecture, among many, that I received from him in my entire life for he was not always easy on me, but he was not going to let me fail.

But more than the dreams he inspired and the encouragement and the wisdom he shared, there was something else he gave me that only had to be observed. It's called work ethic and it's a little out of style today, but it never was with my brother.

When he got out of the Army, he became an insurance salesman going door to door in Indiana with no leads and no help. He had a goal of calling on a hundred households a day and he said most days, 99 doors would be slammed in his face, but he would make that one sale and the next day and the day after he'd do it all over again. After two years, his tenacity won him an interview with State Farm and he was awarded the agency in Carmi. He wasn't just a good insurance agent, he was a great insurance agent, leading the company in sales nearly every year. Late at night, early in the morning, anywhere, anytime a customer needed him, he was there to make the sale or cover the accident to help their family. He never sold them more than they required , and he never misrepresented what they were getting. He worked hard to get their business. He was honest, and people came to him knowing they would be treated fairly. He built trust in his business, and he cared about his customers, attending hundreds of their funerals and family events. He was awarded highest honors from State Farm on many occasions.

I know he was driven to become a successful businessman by the suffocating poverty of his youth because he never wanted his family to experience what he had to go through in his early life. He loved his country, loved his community, and was grateful for the opportunities he received, but above all he loved his family, cherished his kids and grandkids, worried about them, proud of them, maybe demanded more from them sometimes than they could give back, but his love was never in doubt.

In a very real sense, my brother represented the best of what we stand for in this country. The old values. The enduring values. Family, honesty, hard work. I am proud of him. I will always be proud of him.

For the hundreds of friends and family who knew and cared for my brother, I thank you for the moments of your life you were able to share with my brother and for the respect and admiration you had for him.

Jolly Files Complaint; Wants Titles, Vehicles, Jewelry Back

Barely three months into a 171/2 year prison sentence for armed violence, Ron Jolly of Fairfield has filed a lengthy motion asking the court to return a number of vehicles, titles, and jewelry seized as part of his arrest.

Jolly, 48, filed the 20-page pro se motion last month from his jail cell at the Graham Correctional Center at Hillsboro

In his filing, Jolly alleges the State failed to hold up its end of a plea agreement reached when he entered a guilty plea to a Class-X felony charge of armed violence and a Class-4 felony of aggravated fleeing or attempting to elude.

Specifically, Jolly wants returned to Those items include a .22 caliber rifle, flatbed trailer, a 1999 Chevy Tahoe and a 1990 Chevy Suburban.

Jolly does not dispute a long list of weapons and ammo seized by police.

Jolly is also disputing how much "good time" he should be credited against his sentence. According to Jolly's calculations, he is entitled to 915 days of credit against his sentence. The request does not square with Judge Denton's Aud's sentencing memorandum which entitles him to only 115 days spent in local jail awaiting disposition of his case.

All of Jolly's allegations will be taken up during a video hearing set for May 14 in Wayne County Circuit Court.

The Cardinals took the lead in the bottom of the fifth when Zimdars walked before singles from Craig and Carder Walden, the second of which scored the go-ahead run.


Fairfield dropped two games below .500 with the loss, at 6-8.





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
